NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH NEWS

Come meet your neighbors and learn more about Neighborhood Watch

Meeting the first Tuesday of every month at 6:00pm.

The 1st District commissioner for BPU, Bob Milan, will be our speaker for our December 3 Neighborhood Watch meeting.

In 2017, U.S. households spent \$178 billion on electricity — in real terms, 10% less than they spent in 2010. Average consumption in megawatt-hours decreased too, falling from 11.5 to 10.4. The reason? LEDs. According to the *Wall Street Journal*, **no other improvement in the efficiency of household electrical appliances has been as dramatic as the switch from incandescent bulbs to LEDs.**

“When you take an incandescent bulb out and screw in an LED, consumption goes down 80%. Imagine you could get a car that uses 80% less gasoline! The Homes in partnership with the Neighborhood Watch and Livable Neighborhoods now has a supply of Dusk to Dawn lightbulbs for use on your porch. They will cut down on the cost of electricity to 3 cents per month. While the supply lasts, there will be no charge for these bulbs. Please call the office if you need one.

Despite its deep roots in Hmong culture, this complex art was not widely known outside Asia until after the Vietnam War, when Hmong refugees arrive in the United States. The works illustrate the profound relevance of textiles as infrastructure in the Hmong culture, an art form that shifted as it adapted to fit new realities. Now visitors to Kansas City, Kansas Public Library can experience the exhibition, Cloth as Community: Hmong Textiles in America, opening November 10, 2019 at West Wyandotte Library. The exhibition features 27 textiles—flower cloths and embroidered story clothes—by those in the Hmong community. Yard Waste Center 2019 Thanksgiving & Winter Hours

The Wyandotte County Yard Waste & Recycling Center will be closed for the Thanksgiving holiday on both Thursday November 28th and Friday November 29th. It will be open on Saturday November 30th and Sunday, December 1st. The Wyandotte County Yard Waste & Recycling Drop Off Center is located at 3241 Park Drive, Kansas City, Kansas

Starting in December the Wyandotte County Yard Waste Center will begin its winter hours. From December through March the Center will only be open on Saturday and Sunday each week beginning on Saturday December 7th and Sunday December 8th. Hours of operation will be from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday during the winter. It is closed on Holidays.

Wyandotte County residents can take grass clippings, garden trimmings, leaves and branches to the Yard Waste & Recycling Drop Off Center. The Center cannot accept stumps and logs larger than 12 inches in diameter or items more than four feet in length. Wyandotte County residents will need to show a proof of residency such as a driver's license. Commercially generated yard waste material will not be accepted.

Recyclable items accepted include newspapers, magazines, mixed office paper, cardboard, paperboard, food & beverage cans and plastics. Clear, brown, and colored glass are also accepted at the Center. The glass does not have to be separated by color and will be placed in the same container. In addition, other recyclables also do not need to be separated and will be placed in another container.

But there are some plastic items that will not be accepted: No plastic bags. No plastic toys. No motor oil or other auto product container. No herbicide or pesticide containers. No Styrofoam materials such as peanuts, packaging blocks/sheets or cups. No plastic cereal box or cake box liner bags. No plastic 6-pack holders. No plastic pipe, PVC pipe. No plastic building materials or plastic sheet materials

Remodeling Your Kitchen or Bathroom.... Call The Homes

The Homes was built in 1942. The plumbing pipes are galvanized. Even under the best conditions, galvanized plumbing corrodes over time. In areas where there is hard water, your pipes can fail more quickly. What is tricky about galvanized pipes is that while they appear fine on the outside, they could be corroding on the inside. The deposits along the interior of the pipe build up over time, restricting water flow and decreasing the water pressure in your home. This buildup can also impact water pressure in other parts of the pipe and cause leaks.

Corrosion also can occur at the joints, which can result in a leak. Unfortunately, when those leaks happen behind your walls or under your floors, you may not discover them until after your home has already sustained extensive damage.

There are several problems associated with galvanized pipes: low water pressure, uneven water distribution, water discoloration and leaks.

LOW WATER PRESSURE

The corrosion and deposits which form inside the pipes over time decrease the available space inside the pipe, which eventually lowers the water pressure in your home.

UNEVEN DISTRIBUTION OF WATER

Since corrosion often accumulates unevenly, different areas of your home may have different issues with low water pressure. If you aren't the original homeowner, what may have happened is that some of the galvanized pipes may have been replaced by the previous owner while others were left in place.

DISCOLORATION OF WATER

If you notice brown stains in your sink or bathtub, you may have iron in your water, which could be caused by galvanized pipes.

LEAKS

Over time, as galvanized plumbing eventually fails, the joints leak, which can cause extensive damage to your home. Leaks which occur behind walls or under floors, if left unnoticed, can cause severe damage. In this worst-case scenario, a homeowner might not only need to replace pipes, but also repair any resulting damage from the water leak in the foundation, drywall, flooring, ceilings, wooden support beams and sheetrock. A hidden water leak can even lead to mold damage. Adding insult to injury, leaking pipes are a magnet for termites.

Safety Tips for the Holiday

While you are shopping

- Beware of strangers approaching you for any reason. At this time of year, “con-artists” may try various methods of distracting you with the intention of taking your money or belongings.
- Be extra careful if you carry a wallet or purse. They are the prime targets of criminals in crowded shopping areas, transportation terminals, bus stops, on buses and other rapid transit.
- Park in a well-lighted area and lock all doors.
- Never put items in the car’s interior or trunk and then go back for more shopping-a thief can be watching and now knows you have valuables stashed in the car.
- Be aware of your surroundings and report any suspicious persons, and ask security to escort you to your vehicle if you suspect you are being followed.
- Avoid carrying large amounts of cash or wearing expensive jewelry.
- Keep cash in front pocket.
- Pay for purchases with check or credit card when possible.
- Always carry identification with you.
- Stay in groups (safety in numbers).
- Keep a record of all your credit card numbers in a safe place at home.
- As always, keep small children close and tell them in advance to go to a responsible adult in case you get separated. It is also suggested that you have children memorize their name, address and phone number in order to assist law enforcement if needed.

HELPFUL HINTS ABOUT LIVING IN THE HOMES

BE KIND! IF IT SNOWS DON'T PARK IN A SPOT YOU NORMALLY WOULDN'T. IF A NEIGHBOR TAKES THE TIME TO SHOVEL OUT THE SPACE THEY NORMALLY PARK IN, THEN RESPECT THEIR HARD WORK AND DON'T PARK THERE.

DRYER VENTS. To help prevent a fire and to make your dryer efficient you should clean out the dryer vent on the outside of the house. Lint can build up and clog the hole not allowing the heat to escape through the vent.

PLUMBING: DO NOT FLUSH FLUSHABLE WIPES. The pipes in our homes are over 70 years old. They do not have the capacity to wash away any other material. Do not flush baby wipes, feminine hygiene products, diapers, paper towels, Q tips, etc. The sink and tub drains are only for water disposal. Do not force items down the drains. If maintenance finds these items consistently causing a backup in your pipes you may be charged for the repair.

PARKING: The Homes does not have assigned parking. Please be considerate of your neighbors and their parking needs. Try not to park in a spot that is normally used by your neighbor. If you have a guest, have them park in the overflow lots. **NEVER PARK IN YARDS OR COMMON GROUND.**

YARDS & PORCHES: Please take the time to clean up/organize your yard and porch. The size of our porches do not allow for you to keep many items on them before they start to look cluttered and messy. If you do not have a shed an affordable alternative is to store your items in a deck or patio box. They range in cost from \$30 to \$100 and can be purchased on-line or at your local discount store. Items that should not be on your porch: appliances, boxes, buckets, mops, paint containers or any other "non outdoor" items. The office offers free paint for your porch railings.

SPEEDING. The speed limit in The Homes, Inc. is 20 mph. It only takes a few seconds for a distracted child to dart out in the road. Please be aware and safe while driving.

AUTOMOBILE REPAIR. It is against the rules to work on your vehicle in The Homes. If your vehicle needs repair, then you will have to take your vehicle out of the neighborhood or take your vehicle to a mechanic. Unless you are changing a flat tire, you should **NEVER** put your vehicle on a jack in the Homes.

KEEP FURNACE AND WATER HEATER AREAS CLEAN. Having too many clothes, boxes, or general clutter in your utility area can be a fire hazard. Please keep yourself and your neighbors safe and keep your utility areas clean. **DO NOT PILE CLOTHES OR OTHER ITEMS ON TOP OF THE WATER HEATER OR FLU AREA.**

NOISE. Please be mindful of the level of noise you create. It is our responsibility to keep the sound we make to a reasonable level, so we are not disturbing our neighbors. Sometimes, simply communicating with your neighbors and working out an understanding can resolve this and many other problems.

STICKS AND LIMBS: Place sticks/limbs in 4 foot bundles to the curbside for pickup by maintenance.
