Tornado Safety Tips

As severe weather season approaches, now is a good time to discuss and plan with your family what to do in case of an immediate weather threat. Taking 15 minutes to develop and practice a plan could save the lives. Here are some tornado safety tips from the department of environmental health and safety:

Before the storm:

Develop a plan of action

Have frequent drills

Have a NOAA weather radio with a warning alarm tone

Listen to radio and television for information

If planning a trip outdoors, listen to forecasts

If a warning is issued or threatening weather approaches

Always remember "DUCK": Down to the lowest level; Under something sturdy; Cover your head; and Keep in the shelter until the storm has passed.

Stay away from windows.

Get out of automobiles and get into a sturdy structure or ditch.

Or buckle your seat belt and get below window level of your vehicle.

In homes or small buildings: Go to the basement or to an interior room on the lowest floor like a closet or bathroom. Upper floors are unsafe. If there is no time to descend, go to a closet, a small room with strong walls or an inside hallway. Wrap yourself in overcoats or blankets to protect yourself from flying debris. (IN THE HOMES, IF YOU LIVE IN A 1, 2 OR 3 BEDROOM DOWN UNIT SEEK SHELTER IN THE HALLWAY NEAR THE BEDROOM(S) AND BATHROOM. IF YOU LIVE IN A 2 OR 3 BEDROOM UP UNIT SEEK SHELTER IN THE LIVING ROOM NEXT TO THE UTILITY ROOM WALL).

In schools, hospitals, factories or shopping centers: Go to interior rooms and halls on the lowest floor. Stay away from glass enclosed places or areas with wide span roofs such as auditoriums and warehouses. Crouch down and cover your head. Don't take shelter in halls that open to the south or the west. Centrally located stairwells are good shelter.

In high-rise buildings: Go to interior small rooms or halls. Stay away from exterior walls or areas with glass.

If in a mobile home, abandon it immediately: Many deaths occur in mobile homes. If you are in a mobile home when severe weather approaches, leave it immediately and go to a substantial structure or designated tornado shelter. Determine your shelter ahead of time so you don't have to think about it when weather strikes.

If no suitable structure is nearby: Lie flat in the nearest ditch or depression and use your hands to cover your head. Be alert for flash floods.

Tornadoes and overpass safety: In reality, an overpass may be one of the worst places to seek shelter from a tornado. Seeking shelter under an overpass puts you at greater risk of being killed or seriously injured by flying debris from the powerful tornadic winds. If no ditch is available, you may remain in your vehicle, put on your seat belt, lower yourself below window level, and cover your head with your hands or a blanket.

(The city of Kansas City Kansas does not offer permanent tornado shelters. If open, local churches and community centers do offer refuge during a tornado.)

HELPFUL HINTS ABOUT LIVING IN THE HOMES

KEEP FURNACE AND WATER HEATER AREAS CLEAN. Having too many clothes, boxes, or general clutter in your utility area can be a fire hazard. Please keep yourself and your neighbors safe and keep your utility areas clean. DO NOT PILE CLOTHES OR OTHER ITEMS ON TOP OF THE WATER HEATER OR FLU AREA. CHANGE YOUR FURNACE FILTER ONCE A MONTH. FILTERS ARE FREE AT THE OFFICE.

PLUMBING: DO NOT FLUSH FLUSHABLE WIPES. The pipes in our homes are over 70 years old. They do not have the capacity to wash away any other material. Do not flush baby wipes, feminine hygiene products, diapers, paper towels, Q tips, etc. The sink and tub drains are only for water disposal. Do not force items down the drains. If maintenance finds these items consistently causing a back-up in your pipes you may be charged for the repair.

LITTERING. Think twice about throwing your trash out your car window or into someone's yard. First, it's rude and selfish. Someone will have to pick it up and most of the time it is the maintenance staff. This takes time and money away from other resident's needs. Second, it is against the law. Littering is a Class C violation that is punishable by a fine up to a \$500.00. If you are witnessed littering the police will be called and you will be charged, by The Homes, for the time it takes to pick it up and dispose of it.

PARKING: The Homes does not have assigned parking. Please be considerate of your neighbors and their parking needs. Try not to park in a spot that is normally used by your neighbor. If you have guest, have them park in the overflow lots. If you have vehicles that you do not drive, park it in a overflow lot. **NEVER PARK IN YARDS OR COMMON GROUND.**

NOISE. Please be mindful of the level of noise you create. It is our responsibility to keep the sound we make to a reasonable level so we are not disturbing our neighbors. Sometimes, simply communicating with your neighbors and working out an understanding can resolve this and many other problems.

YARDS & PORCHES: Please take the time to clean up/organize your yard and porch. The size of our porches do not allow for you to keep many items on them before they start to look cluttered and messy. If you do not have a shed an affordable idea to store your items in are: deck and patio boxes. They range in cost from \$30 to \$100 and can be purchased on-line or at your local discount store. Items that should not be on your porch: appliances, boxes, buckets, mops, paint containers or any other "non outdoor" items. The office offers free paint for the porches.

SECURE YOUR HOME. It is very important that you have a trusted family member or friend on your stock certificate. In the event of your death, if you are the sole person on the stock certificate your home will go into probate. Probate can be messy, expensive and time consuming to relatives and friends. Plan for the future.

SPEEDING. The speed limit in The Homes, Inc. is 20 mph. It only takes a few seconds for a distracted child to dart out in the road. Please be aware and safe while driving.

TRASH COLLECTION. Trash pick-up is every Wednesday. Trash should not be put to the curb before Tuesday evening. If you have other items at the curb and the trash company does not take it, the Homes will pick it up and a charge will be added to your account.

- •Women 40 years and older do not need a doctor's order for screening (non-symptomatic) mammograms.
- •Women 35-39 years old may obtain a baseline screening mammogram. They should check with their insurance provider prior to the screening for plan eligibility and coverage.
- •You will need your insurance card and the name of your primary care physician.
- •Uninsured patients who qualify may receive a covered mammogram through Early Detection Works in Kansas: https://www.kdhe.ks.gov/826/Early-Detection-Works-EDW.
- •Patients should not be pregnant or be breastfeeding.
- •The coach is not ADA-accessible due to vehicle parameters.
- •On the day of your mammogram, please wear a two-piece outfit so you don't have to fully disrobe and avoid lotions, deodorants, and powders above the waist.

Evergy Power Check Device

Ever wonder how much certain appliances and other household items cost you in electricity a year? Now there is a new device that monitors that and it's as easy as checking it out at the public library. It's called the new Evergy Power Check device. Plug it into anything in your house that takes electricity and it will tell you what it's costing you.

"Convert that electricity use into dollars spent by day, week, month even an entire year," said Kally Johns, program manager for Evergy.

It's an idea with two parts: Saving energy, and helping consumers reduce energy bills by identifying what devices are using the most energy.

"Old refrigerators, freezers, older plasma TVs around the house and those gaming systems can really suck energy use," Johns said.

Evergy teamed up with the Kansas City and Mid-Continent libraries to make the device easier to get for people wanting to use it.

"We've had some really positive comments on our social media. They're excited about it," said Joel Jones, deputy director of library services.

The device is something that can be checked out at Kansas City area libraries for up to 14 days with two renewals. All that's needed is a library card.

Evergy said it works for phantom load energy use, telling users how much items like phone chargers and TVs plugged into a wall, but not in use, are costing.

"It helps you understand, you know, which appliance or electronics you might need to unplug when they are not in use or maybe put some of those on a power strip so that way you can turn that power strip off when you walk away," Johns said.

Evergy is holding a free event from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. Thursday at the Northeast Kansas City Library branch at 6000 Wilson Rd.

Utility officials said there is a downloadable worksheet on the <u>Evergy website</u> that will help people figure what items to test.

Best Security Cameras For Outdoor Home Use

Wyze Cam v3

The Wi-Fi security camera features HD video quality live streaming, motion detection, night vision, a decent app and, best of all, 14 days of free motion-based cloud storage. This Wyze security camera also features a built-in microSD card slot if you want local video storage rather than relying solely on its cloud service (you have to buy the microSD card separately). This home security camera features a motion detection zone and the ability to listen for and alert you to special frequencies, like smoke alarms. You can purchase this camera at Amazon, Walmart and Best Buy for \$36.00. Each camera will need a power source.

Blink Outdoor

Its wire-free, battery-powered design also makes the Blink Outdoor easy to install. You don't have to run wires or plug in power cords. Mount the Blink wherever you need it. Installation is a cinch and will only take you a few minutes. The Blink Outdoor uses the Blink Sync Module 2 to hook up to your Wi-Fi. The Sync Module 2 also offers a local storage option—just use a USB drive. If you prefer cloud storage, Blink has subscription plans starting at three dollars a month. The Blink Outdoor has an advertised battery life of two years on just two AA batteries. That's great if you don't want to worry about recharging your camera every other month or so. You can purchase this camera at Amazon, Home Depot and Best Buy for \$99.00
